

Legislators returned to Springfield for the second year of the 103rd General Assembly on January 16, 2024. It was a quiet week. Provided that it is an election year, it is expected for a very slow start and a reluctance to confront controversial issues. Historically, much of the heavy lifting occurs in the first year of any General Assembly and legislators will not be returning to the Capitol until February 6th.

Legislation for the 2024 spring session is actively being filed, but it has been gradual so far. We have now entered the inaugural "blackout period," during which time the Legislative Reference Bureau (LRB) will not accept requests for amendments. The blackout period will be lifted at the same time as the deadline to introduce new legislation on February 9th. The more than 7,000 bills filed last calendar year remain viable and lawmakers could act on those as well between now and May.

SOS Expanding Online Services

Secretary of State Alexi Giannoulias is urging Illinois drivers looking to update their vehicle registration or renew their license to skip a planned visit to a DMV facility and instead use his offices' newly expanded online services. After initially encountering a severe problem with noshows to scheduled appointments, a new text message notification system will now require individuals to confirm or cancel their upcoming appointments. The office has also established an online portal to clarify what services require an in-person appointment and what can be quicker online, over the phone, or via mail.

HB4431- Rep. Jeff Keicher-

New legislation would amend the Illinois Vehicle Code, ending requirements for drivers over the age of 75 to retake a driving test to renew their driver's license.

According to data from the National Safety Council, after age 34 the number of drivers involved in fatal crashes decreases as the age of the driver increases.

While many may have preconceived notions about older drivers causing more car accidents, State Representative Jeff Keicher says the facts show seniors are actually the safest drivers on the road.

"Illinois is the only state in the United States that does this, I think it's time we trust our seniors" Keicher said.

According to the Illinois Department of Transportation, in 2022, 24.39 out of every 1,000 Illinois drivers over the age of 75 have gotten in a crash, the lowest crash rate for every range of drivers between 16 and 69 years old.
